WHEREAS, Tazewell County, through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) of 2009, and pending final approval of the Policy Committee of the Peoria/Pekin Urbanized Area Transportation Study (PPUATS), has received an allotment of \$1,186,467.33; and

WHEREAS, the County Engineer has reviewed priorities for use of subject funds and recommends the following projects for funding and seeks the approval of the Tazewell County Board to proceed with engineering of said projects; and

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Tazewell County Board would approve said recommendation of the Transportation Committee.

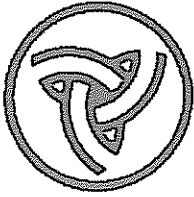

CIRCULAR LETTER 2009-03

AMERICAN RECOVERY AND REINVESTMENT ACT (ARRA) OF 2009

General Information

Approximately \$281 million of Illinois' economic stimulus funds for transportation improvements are to be allocated to local agencies:

- Nearly \$203 million of this amount is to be sub-allocated to areas with populations over 200,000:

◦ Chicago	\$175,253,358
◦ Round Lake Beach	\$ 4,679,631
◦ Rockford	\$ 6,111,395
◦ Rock Island/Quad Cities	\$ 3,140,381
◦ Peoria	\$ 5,586,123
◦ East St. Louis/Metro-East	\$ 8,077,088
- Of the remaining \$78 million, \$45 million will be sub-allocated to urban areas with populations between 5,000 and 200,000. Please see the attached listing of urban allotments.
- The last \$33 million will be sub-allocated to the ninety-six downstate Illinois counties based on non-urban population, non-urban area (square miles), and non-urban centerline mileage. Townships and municipalities with populations less than 5,000 can coordinate with the counties for use of this \$33 million. Please see the attached listing of rural allotments.

In addition, Illinois is receiving approximately \$28 million in stimulus funding for Enhancement projects to be used in the same manner as our Illinois Transportation Enhancement Program (ITEP) funds. These funds will be provided at an 80% federal/20% local match ratio; the local agency will be required to provide the 20% match utilizing local funds.

Except for the aforementioned Enhancement funds, all other economic stimulus funds will be provided at a 100% funding ratio; no local matching funds will be required. However, the local agency will not be allowed to exceed the dollar amount of its economic stimulus allotment.¹ Therefore, if the total project costs exceed the economic stimulus allotment, the local agency will be required to utilize other funding sources (including their regular federal allotments) to accommodate any funding shortfall. Use of regular federal allotments in a stimulus project will still require the necessary local match. Federal funds are not allowed to match other federal dollars.

The federal economic stimulus funds are not grants to be given directly to local agencies.² These funds will be received through a reimbursable process, whereby either the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) or the local agency provides the initial funding required for each project. To be eligible for federal reimbursement, work on a project cannot begin until federal authorization. Once the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) has authorized the funds for the project and work is actually under way, IDOT requests and receives reimbursement from the federal government for the federal share of the project. The FHWA will reimburse 100% of these funds to the state or local agency only after evidence is shown that expenditures were conducted within federal regulations (including environmental, labor, business practices, etc.).

The funds sub-allocated to the local agencies must be federally obligated within one year of apportionment by FHWA [This deadline is estimated to be March 2010.], or these funds will be redistributed to other states that can use the funds.

Even though the ARRA is intended to be accomplished within a limited timeframe, the same federal guidelines and procedures for the use of federal funds will be required. FHWA will not implement any shortcuts for expediency throughout the various phases of the funded projects.

Highway construction projects utilizing stimulus funds will need to be located on federal-aid routes functionally classified as urban collectors, rural major collectors or higher. However, since ARRA funds are to be implemented using federal Surface Transportation Program (STP) funding guidelines, bridge projects and safety projects on any public road are eligible for the stimulus funds.

Each project that has not been previously published in the IDOT Multi-Year Highway Improvement Program will have to be amended to the current Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) in order to meet public involvement policies for federal authorization:

- If a project is in a Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) area, it must be included in that MPO's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).
- For projects in non-MPO areas, the process requires the lead local agency to publish the project in a local publication (i.e., newspaper) for a 15-day public comment period. If, after that time, there has been no negative feedback on the proposed project, IDOT is notified and then requests FHWA to approve this project to be amended into the current STIP.

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Although the federal funds are being provided to the states via the ARRA package, the Illinois General Assembly will need to approve the necessary appropriation (authority to spend) for these additional funds.

Due to the Illinois General Assembly still needing to approve the appropriation to utilize the ARRA funds, we anticipate that the earliest state letting for local ARRA projects will be the June 12, 2009 letting.

Each local entity should prioritize a list of projects to fit within its economic stimulus allotment and provide that listing to the appropriate IDOT District Bureau of Local Roads by **March 25, 2009**. If the projects are approved, the local agencies will be notified to proceed.

Please contact the applicable IDOT District Bureau of Local Roads and Streets with any questions on the federal economic stimulus funds. Local agencies should establish an open line of communication with their Local Roads Field Engineer who will strive to ensure these stimulus projects are completed in accordance with federal regulations and the plans of the local agency in order to best serve the needs of the traveling public.
